


2006 Winner - *Fantastic Farm Machines*




2003 Winner - *Oh Say Can You Seed?*

Chall's timeless story and Daly's glowing paintings invite children to share in the pleasure of making maple syrup – a process that's the same today as it was two hundred years ago.


