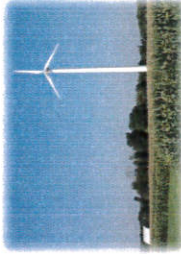

W.I. Miller & Sons is a multigenerational family owned grain farm producing corn, soybeans, wheat, oats, and barley on over 5,000 acres. For nearly fifty years they have produced Ohio Certified Seed with the wheat, oats, and barley raised on their farm. Besides farming, W.I. Miller & Sons also operates an agricultural retail business supplying other local farmers with fertilizer, agricultural chemicals, seed and other crop inputs.

The Miller family has a great passion for preserving and protecting farmland for future generations with Agricultural and Conservation Easements placed on their property. They have expressed this by protecting nearly 3,200 acres of land with the Western Reserve Land Conservancy and will also be preserving another 300 acres in 2015.



Logan Acres Farm is a continuation of the dream Art Logan's great grandparents, George M. and Mary and grandparents, Russell and Luella, had in 1913 when they milked 13 cows, raised potatoes, sold eggs and farmed the land located on the east side of the road. The farming operation was expanded by Art's dad and mom, George and Anna, adding more cows and more land to the operation. The farm has seen many changes over the past 102 years, but the dream and love of farming continues as now, the sixth generation of Logans becomes active!

Logan Acres Farm is owned and operated by Art and Elthie, and their two sons, Steve and Dave who both have off-farm jobs but are dedicated to this way of life. Grandsons, Zac, Matt and Jeff are actively lending their young pairs of hands (and opinions) as they learn the family business. "It takes all of us to do the work and make this business a success!"

The heifer raising business was started in April 1995. The larger barn and a manure management facility were added in November 1996. Today, the Logans are raising heifers for 3 local dairy operations, all of which are within 60 miles of the farm. The barns are filled to capacity with 350 heifers, some of which are 4-H heifers belonging to the grandsons.

The heifer raising business is supported by 350 acres of our own land, consisting of alfalfa and grass hay, corn and soybeans. Hay and corn silage are harvested and stored in 3 Harvestors for year-round feeding.



Gustavus Federated Church

In 1809 some members of the Kinsman Methodist Church began meeting in Gustavus for Bible study and fellowship and in 1840 started their own worship services in a building on the south west corner of the center. The Gustavus Congregational Church was formed in 1852 and two years later, Alfred Morey built their church on Route 87 east of the town hall. In 1856 Mr. Morey built the current church facility for the Methodists; it was patterned in the Greek Revival style with a squared belfry. In 1908 that church building was raised and a basement built underneath. Stained glass windows were installed at that time along with a basement access door on the south side of the building. In 1928 the Methodist and Congregational Churches merged to become Gustavus Federated Church, which has made its home in the current facility ever since. The old Congregational Church became the Grange Hall, then later an auction facility and was subsequently torn down.

The Gustavus Masonic Lodge built the Fraternal Hall next door to the church in 1870 and in 1956 the church purchased that building to use for Sunday school classes. Both buildings, along with the school, the town hall and the other houses on the square, were placed on the National Register of Historic Buildings in 1975. A new bell was installed in the church belfry in 1988, given by his family in memory of Dr. Bruce Riley, a former pastor. The bell was cast in Holland of a special ringing bell bronze and weighs 196 pounds. The bell is on a timer now and is rung on Sunday mornings and at noon and 7pm each weekday.

One of only three public buildings in the township (including the town hall and the volunteer fire hall), Gustavus Church is the center of our community, used for many public and private events as well as religious services. Our regular Sunday worship is at 11:00am, with Sunday school classes for adults and children at 10:00 during the school year. Our doors are open to all who wish to worship God and we welcome your presence with us.
