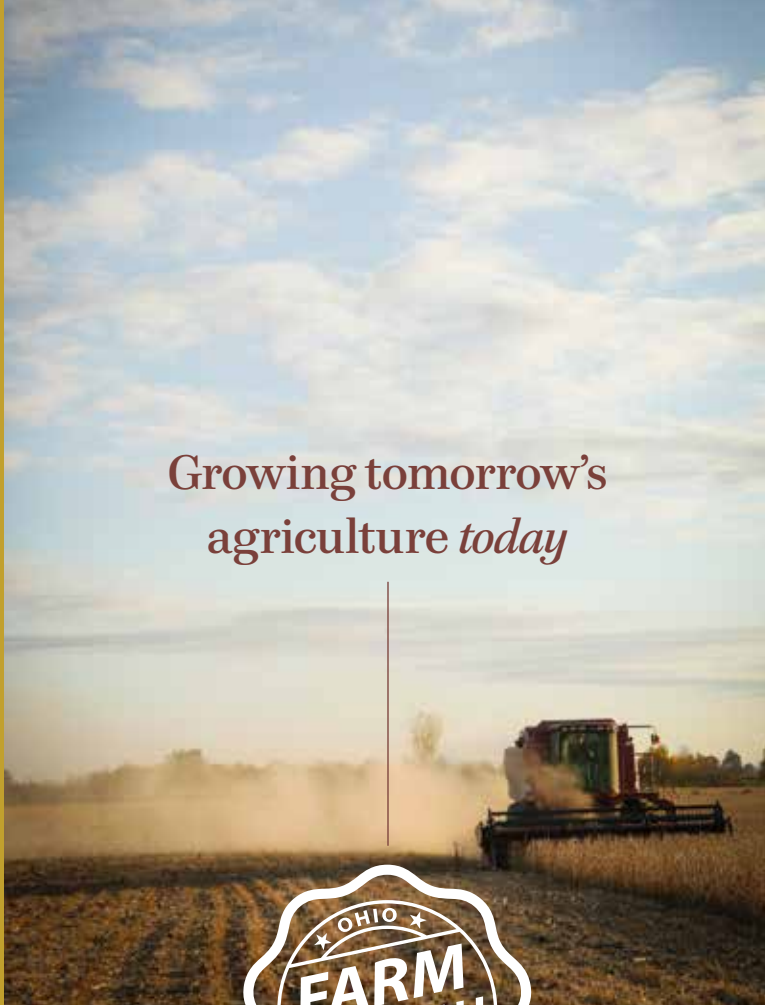

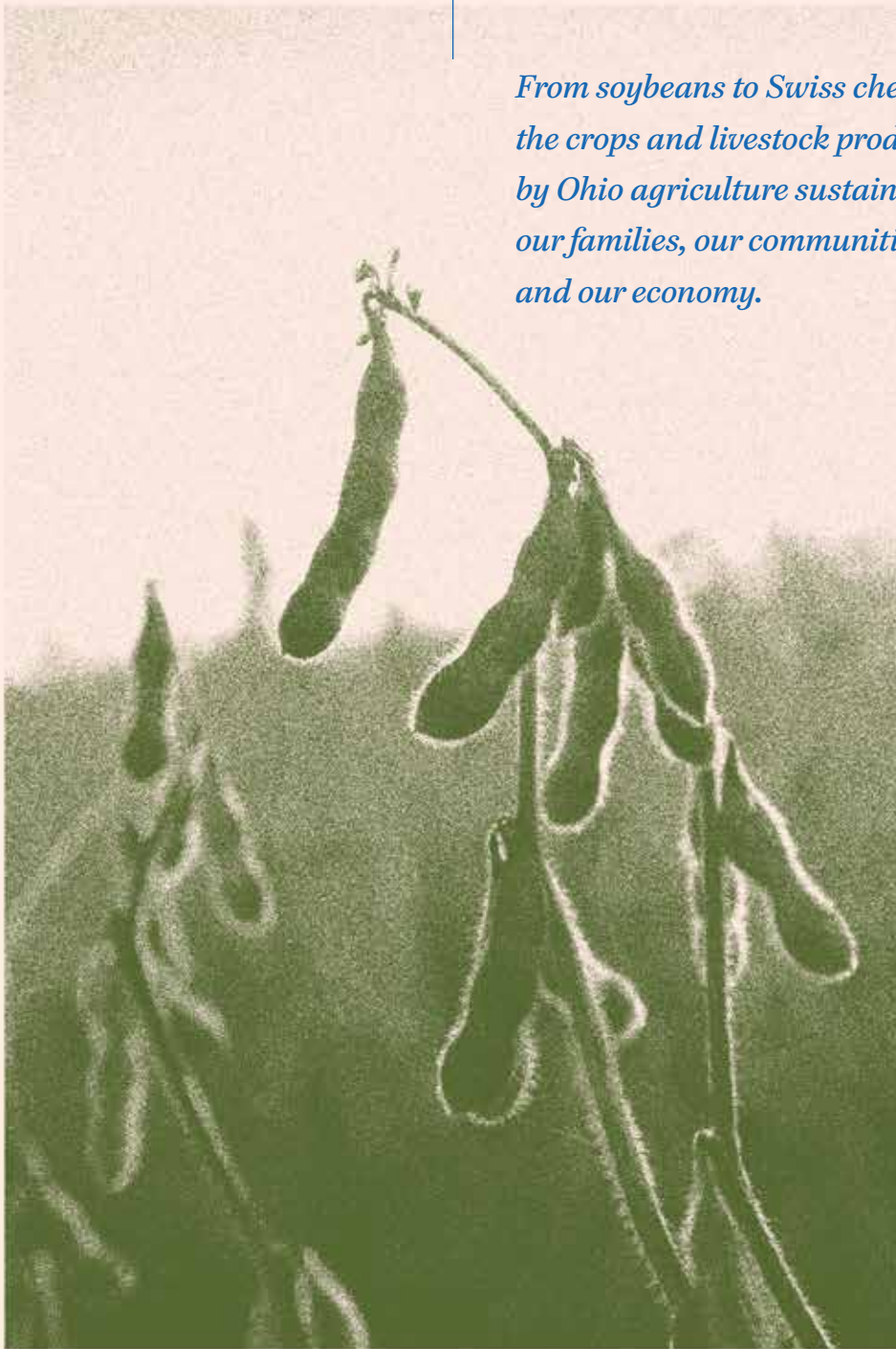

Recognizing the Value of Farming

The farms that enliven our state feed us, clothe us and fuel us. Some are the work of generations, handed down through the decades. Some are fresh enterprises, sparked by cutting-edge science. Some are co-ops, some are corporations. All are part of Ohio's landscape and legacy. All are part of Ohio's progress and prosperity.

Agriculture is one of the largest industries and economic contributors in our state.

Beyond the production of food, fuel and fiber, a huge range of related scientific and support industries contribute to Ohio agriculture.

Manufacturers, banks, research labs, insurance agencies, retailers—each plays a role in ensuring Ohio products reach dinner tables, dressing rooms, greenhouses, grocery stores and fuel tanks across our counties and the country. Yet as vast and productive as our agricultural industry is currently, **projections indicate that in the next 10 years, we will need:**

- *470,000 new workers in agribusiness*
- *90,000 new workers in direct farming operations*

Where will this workforce come from? How will we sustain the industry that benefits our state?

At the Ohio Farm Bureau Foundation, we believe that the key to a vital agricultural industry in the next decade—and countless decades beyond that—is helping young people understand all the growth opportunities agriculture has to offer.

Our work starts with what we call “ag literacy”: educating students and teachers about agriculture and all the aspects of their lives that it impacts—whether it’s the milk they pour on their morning cereal or the wool sweater they grab when it’s chilly.



By helping young people gain ag literacy, we introduce them to the educational and employment possibilities related to farming. As they visit a tractor manufacturer, observe the use of robotics and precision technology or study food science, they learn not only about the industry, but also about their own interests and purpose. They see that agriculture includes entomologists and engineers, hog farmers and policymakers—and that it can include their aspirations and skills, too.

Through our work, the foundation inspires both the young people who will run the family farm, and those who will start their own entrepreneurial ventures. Those who love getting dirt on their hands, and those who love studying soil under a microscope. Those who want to climb into a combine, and those who want to climb the corporate ladder.



To cultivate future generations of Ohio's farmers, the foundation takes a three-pronged approach to inspiring their interest in and commitment to agriculture.

1.

Scholarships: We award scholarships to hundreds of students attending public, private and community colleges throughout the state, who are majoring in agricultural, environmental policy or agriculture-related fields, as well as to students whose career paths will enhance the agricultural industry. To support the future of agriculture throughout Ohio, each county has a scholarship fund to allot to its local students. Other scholarships focus on specific issues such as women's leadership in agriculture, livestock and crop sciences, sheep production and management and more.

With your contribution, the foundation will offer larger, renewable awards to more students. We can support the education of a steady flow of young people trained and excited to enhance farming for decades to come.



Rose Hartschuh didn't grow up on a farm. But her children will.

On their dairy farm in Sycamore, Rose is passing along her agricultural knowledge to her twin 8-year-olds, sharing what she's learned as a college student, dairy owner, county Farm Bureau member and a trustee of the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation.

Rose credits the Darwin Bryan Scholarship she received from the Ohio Farm Bureau Foundation for establishing her path. With the award, Rose says, "The Ohio Farm Bureau Foundation made college attainable to me."

"The belief that the foundation placed in me to succeed was a motivating factor to make the most out of my college career."


While studying Agricultural Education at The Ohio State University, Rose found both community and purpose. She says, "I admired the camaraderie that existed within the industry, and I also appreciated the importance of feeding the world."

Degree in hand, Rose was prepared to begin her career in agriculture. But she points out that her scholarship did more than educate her. It connected her, by prompting her to get involved with the Ohio Farm Bureau. After graduating and moving to another part of the state, the first thing Rose did was join the county Farm Bureau board.

Rose explains, "It is the relationships I have formed with my peers, mentors and professionals in the industry that have continued to allow me to experience new opportunities and to grow as a person and as a professional."

Rose now passes along the support she's gained from the Ohio Farm Bureau to her young sons. That spirit of paying it forward underlies her advice to the next generation: "Give back to your community and serve those around you.

The rest will fall into place."



ExploreAg is designed to introduce participants to the range of careers in agriculture. Sometimes, one day is all it takes.

In 2019, ExploreAg offered a free one-day experience for teens to learn about Ohio Electric Cooperatives for a day. “Our connection to Ohio Farm Bureau harkens to our roots,” said Doug Miller, a VP with OEC and an Ohio Farm Bureau Foundation board member. Ohio Farm Bureau’s first Executive Secretary, Murray Lincoln, led the effort to bring electricity to Ohio’s countryside, which not only improved farm operations, but quality of life for rural residents in the 1930s.

Supporting electric services in rural communities prompted brothers Mike and Tim Taylor of Paulding County to sign up for ExploreAg. Being a lineman, Mike says, is “what I always wanted to do.”

*“But it’s one thing to dream about a job.
It’s a whole other thing to learn what it takes
to actually accomplish that dream.”*

“We got to talk to multiple linemen who have worked in the trade for a long time at the ExploreAg day,” Mike continues. “It was really cool to sit and talk with them, as well as people from different departments to see the wide variety of what is out there.”

That experience cemented the brothers’ choice: After ExploreAg, Mike and Tim went on to train with electric co-ops. Both now have those dream jobs—as a lineman and mechanic, respectively—ensuring the power stays on for their communities.



2.

Innovative programming:

Our signature ag literacy and workforce development program, ExploreAg, offers free immersion programs. In ExploreAg, teens learn about agriculture and related STEM fields from industry experts, scientists and educators. Participants visit producers like Smucker’s, manufacturers like John Deere and research laboratories at Ohio State; develop their leadership and collaboration skills; and prepare for college and career.

With a gift from you, the foundation will continue to motivate future farmers with these free educational experiences, and expand the reach of our programming into more counties.

3.

Grants: The foundation awards grants to county Farm Bureaus and partner organizations that share our goal of helping young people discover their purpose and passion in agricultural careers.

With your support, the foundation will issue grants in greater numbers and amounts. Likewise, we can partner with organizations in all of Ohio’s counties to strengthen pathways to careers in agriculture statewide.

In 2020, the Ohio Farm Bureau Foundation issued a grant to Hocking County Farm Bureau and the Center for Cooperatives to launch an innovative online program: the Youth Cooperative Leadership Experience. This free program, currently offered to high schoolers in 32 of Ohio’s Appalachian area counties, is designed to expose future farmers to careers in agricultural cooperatives.

Students hear from leaders and members of feed and grain, restaurant and insurance cooperatives, learning about how cooperatives pool resources, share expertise and achieve success collaboratively. By participating in experiences like the Youth Cooperative Leadership Experience, students also learn about the vast range of opportunities within their county and community.
